

MARRIAGE: Contact the Pastor at least six months prior to the date desired to begin the mandatory Preparation program.

CARE OF THE SICK: Emergency calls are made as soon as the priest is available. If desired, communion may be brought to the homebound each weekend by a Eucharistic Minister. Families are asked to contact the Church Office to make arrangements. Communion Calls to the homebound are the first Friday of the month. Please contact the Church Office in regard to those who are seriously ill or hospitalized, leaving the hospital and room number. FUNERALS & BURIAL: The family must make arrangements with the Pastor before finalizing arrangements with a funeral home.

From a human experience, what could possibly be greater than the appearance of God and a couple of his saints representing

the Law and the prophets?

We have the amazing position to see ordinary bread and wine turn into the body blood soul and divinity of Jesus Christ at each Mass we are less than 3 feet away from this amazing miracle. This is a humble God. He showed himself to Peter, John and that is good enough for me.

If we were to see this though... my whole self would be just like Peter ... stammering, flabbergasted, not sure what I am seeing and I would want to be a part of that particular singularity for all time. However, that isn't our vocation is it? It wasn't Peters vocation either? It is very scary when I realize that Peter and I actually have the same vocation. Preach the word of God to all the corners of the Earth.

So, what if I am up on the mountain in "the tent" worshiping God? That is good for a while. But not the totality right now of what God is calling me to. But notice too, Peter didn't stop with just a tent to worship God. Moses and Elijah as well, uh oh... Can't worship Moses and Elijah can we? There is a reason the other readings are read along with this. We have to be reminded in our first reading about the original covenant between Abram and God.

And just to be sure The reading from Paul's letter to the Philippians as another prodding to remember who our God actually is. Okay it will probably take no more to say okay Moses and Elijah don't get a tent... but Could Peter have been okay if he just stopped with a tent for Jesus? Who knows... that is not what the story is showing but after the resurrection Peter did build tents for God in that he established the Churches in Rome and in Asia Minor. But between the time of the transfiguration and the Resurrection of Jesus there was other work Peter was deigned to do.

So, Peter, James and John were not to stay up on the mountaintop and continually witness the Transfiguration... they were to serve the Lord and learn and become ready for their apostolates. Had they stayed on the mountain, who would give us the recounting of the Transfiguration? Think of all the things that are still to be learned by all of them. Plus, I think we have all had that mountaintop type of experience. We really enjoyed that particular feeling and experience we had, but we recognize we couldn't have just stopped there. .deacondavestowell/

So, we keep those memories and the feelings and keep them as a cornerstone of our lives that teach us so very much. But we don't build a tent for those feelings and those experiences. As they are gifts from God...not God himself. Most important to remember this. So, let's continue our learning and take those mountaintop memories and consider what God is actually calling us to do with them. If we listen to Him we can never go wrong. Be good. Play nice. Think God!

SCRUTINIES

Part of the RCIA process is the period of Purification and Enlightenment.

During this process we celebrate the Scrutinies with those who will be joining the church at the Easter Vigil.

These rites are meant to uncover, then heal all that is weak, defective, or sinful of the elect' to bring out, then strengthen all that is upright, strong, and good." (RCIA 141). The elect look within themselves to find anything that keeps them from Christ. Then they look to Christ to heal those weaknesses and strengthen them when they face temptation. These rites are also a good time for all of us to take a look within ourselves. It's gives us the opportunity for self-searching, repentance and to move closer to Christ.

The scrutinies will occur on the third, fourth, and fifth Sundays of Lent. We reflect on three Gospel stories that reveal the meaning of baptism. In the first Scrutiny we reflect on Christ as Living Water, in second scrutiny we reflect on Christ as the Light of the World and in the third scrutiny we reflect on Christ as the Resurrection and the Life. They give us the opportunity to turn back toward God, remembering that he is always turned toward us — with arms outstretched and a heart full of love and mercy, eager to forgive.

We will celebrate these scrutinies in St. Gabriel at the 10:00 A.M. Mass on March 3rd, 10th and 17th. At that mass we will use the readings for liturgical year "A". We will use the readings for the "B" cycle at the 4:00 P.M. and 8:00 A.M. Masses.

Reflection for Divine Mercy Sunday

How can anyone argue against Divine Mercy Sunday?

Divine Mercy is hope wrapped up in a loving God, ever ready to embrace us and forgive even our gravest sins. Believing in God, but not in Divine Mercy, would be a depressing and burdensome faith to bear.

At the core of the Gospel story of the good thief is unconditional love and compassion. Today, you will be with me in paradise. Not, okay your sins are forgiven; now do this and this, and you will be saved. But today - now - you will enter into glory with me. Welcome!

Divine Mercy is often associated with the visions and private revelations of St. Faustina. Pope John Paul II had a great devotion to this Polish nun. When he declared the Second Sunday of Easter to be Divine Mercy Sunday, many took it as a papal decree to promote the devotions described in Faustina's "Diary," such as venerating the Divine Mercy image and praying the Chaplet.

As Catholics, we have a soft spot for devotions and devotionals. It's part of our hands-on, sacramental nature. But, we are also a diverse bunch. What speaks to one, may not speak to another. Devotions and belief in private revelations – even if approved and recommended by the Church – are not mandatory. Offering a special Mass that includes the Divine Mercy devotions for those who wish it is a good thing.

Presenting the devotions as an obligatory form of worship for the Second Sunday of Easter is not. Even <u>some</u> <u>Divine Mercy websites</u> are careful to stress that this Sunday is not meant to be a "party for devotees." The focus, they say, should be on bringing "hardened sinners" back into the fold.

Perhaps we, as a Church, need to spend less time worrying about bringing back the "hardened sinners," and more time showing mercy to those struggling to stay despite personal hurts and rejection. We need to reach out to those who have one foot out the door, or who have already had the door closed on them.

As we meditate in gratitude for God's gracious mercy shown to us, we should look honestly at the mercy that we show to others. Our God is a God of mercy. Are we a Church of mercy?
