

This lection may end a little too early. We need verse 36 to help unify the passage. We begin, after all, with some Greeks saying they want to SEE

Jesus and we end with Jesus HIDING himself. In between we get the famous image of a seed falling into the earth, which is yet another form of "hiding" (literally of going underground!) through which the paradox of the gospel comes through once again. In verse 32 Jesus says he will be lifted up and will draw all people to himself but in reality, the manner in which he will be lifted up will be so hideous—such a counter-intuitive action—that people will not feel drawn to Jesus. The seed will be in the process of diving under the soil to die. Jesus will not, on the cross, appear to be going anywhere worth following. Blessed are those who follow anyway. The result is eternal life.

Questions for Reflection:

Where have these days taken us? Have we grown in our relationship with God?

- 1. What have we taken from Lent? Are we changed, transformed by this season of penance and prayer?
- 2. **Are we seeing the world differently?** Lent invites us to new perspectives.
- 3. Are we engaging more deeply in prayer and reflection? Silence and meditation draw us closer to God.
- 4. Are we giving ourselves generously to others? Lent calls us to be Christ to those in need.

Lent is our spiritual springtime—a time for renewal and growth. Beyond the hill of Calvary lies the miracle of Easter. Let us continue striving, imperfectly but persistently, seeking holiness and the promise of resurrection.

From the desk of Deacon John Veron:

This 5th Sunday of Lent we enter the last 2 weeks of our Lenten Journey. How has it been so far? Hopefully we have all entered more deeply into fasting, prayer and almsgiving that we were called to at the beginning of Lent in the readings from Ash Wednesday. Perhaps many of us have grown weary of the sacrifices we originally committed to and had a little bit of a stumble along the way. We are encouraged at this point in our journeys to stay on the course or get back on track. It's typical of human weakness to stumble. But our stumbling can be a cause for humility, one of the greatest of virtues. It's hard to judge/condemn others when we look at our own failings. We pray that God give us the gift of humility that will prepare us to have a fruitful conclusion to Lenten journey and celebrate joyfully in the Easter resurrection.

I encourage everyone to participate in the upcoming holy week starting next week with Palm Sunday. It is the holiest week of the year for the Church. Check our bulletin for the Triduum services including Way of the Cross at noon on Good Friday. You may want to skip the crawfish boil anyways and opt for Good Friday services this year with the bugs at 10-12 dollars a pound. Yikes! God will go to great lengths to get our attention!

Lisa and I have participated quite regularly in the Triduum (three days-Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Vigil Saturday night) for many years and plan to do so again this year. The spiritual fruits we've gained are immeasurable. Please join Fr. Reflection for Divine Mercy Sunday

How can anyone argue against Divine Mercy Sunday?

Divine Mercy is hope wrapped up in a loving God, ever ready to embrace us and forgive even our gravest sins. Believing in God, but not in Divine Mercy, would be a depressing and burdensome faith to bear.

At the core of the Gospel story of the good thief is unconditional love and compassion. Today, you will be with me in paradise. Not, okay your sins are forgiven; now do this and this and this, and you will be saved. But today - now - you will enter into glory with me. Welcome!

Divine Mercy is often associated with the visions and private revelations of St. Faustina. Pope John Paul II had a great devotion to this Polish nun. When he declared the Second Sunday of Easter to be Divine Mercy Sunday, many took it as a papal decree to promote the devotions described in Faustina's "Diary," such as venerating the Divine Mercy image and praying the Chaplet.

As Catholics, we have a soft spot for devotions and devotionals. It's part of our handson, sacramental nature. But we are also a diverse bunch. What speaks to one, may not speak to another. Devotions and belief in private revelations — even if approved and recommended by the Church — are not mandatory. Offering a special Mass that includes the Divine Mercy devotions for those who wish it is a good thing.

Presenting the devotions as an obligatory form of worship for the Second Sunday of Easter is not. Even <u>some Divine Mercy websites</u> are careful to stress that this Sunday is not meant to be a "party for devotees." The focus, they say, should be on bringing "hardened sinners" back into the fold.

Perhaps we, as a Church, need to spend less time worrying about bringing back the "hardened sinners," and more time showing mercy to those struggling to stay despite personal hurts and rejection. We need to reach out to those who have one foot out the door, or who have already had the door closed on them.

As we meditate in gratitude for God's gracious mercy shown to us, we should look honestly at the mercy that we show to others. Our God is a God of mercy. Are we a Church of mercy?
