<u>MARRIAGE</u>: Contact the Pastor at least six months prior to the date desired to begin the mandatory Preparation program.

<u>CARE OF THE SICK</u>: Emergency calls are made as soon as the priest is available. If desired, communion may be brought to the homebound each weekend by a Eucharistic Minister. Families are asked to contact the Church Office to make arrangements. Communion Calls to the homebound are the first Friday of the month. Please contact the Church Office in regard to those who are seriously ill or hospitalized, leaving the hospital and room number. <u>FUNERALS & BURIAL</u>: The family must make arrangements with the Pastor before finalizing arrangements with a funeral home.

Msgr. Marionneaux Collection



We will open the sign up for January, 2026 in November, 2025. We will only accept Masses for January, February and March at that time.

Last week I spoke about the role of the Saints in the Church and now I'd like to reflect on a few saints who have deeply impacted my life. To better explain why these two saints have been important in my life, I'd like to first give a quick reflection on how I see the saints. For me, reading the life of each saint can be compared to doing a Lectio Divina on a particular scripture verse. Each saint seems to bring forth a deeper understanding of what the Lord desires to speak to us in the Sacred Scriptures. The two saints I am about to dive into brought about a greater understanding for me of the following verse: "I give praise to you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, for although you have hidden these things from the wise and the learned you have revealed them to the childlike." (Matt. 11:25)

A little over a year after converting to the Catholic Faith, I found myself on my first silent retreat. While I loved the experience of being truly quiet for the first time in my life, I had no idea what it meant to be interiorly silent, let alone to spend the entire day in prayer. While I did have a few good moments in prayer, I wound up spending most of the time taking pictures of the beauty I was encountering and reading a book about this Saint a few people had previously told me about: St. Therese of Lisieux. I was completely captivated by this woman and the way that she spoke about her relationship with the Lord: "Jesus

points out to me the only way which leads to Love's furnace – that way is self-surrender – it is the confidence of the little child who sleeps without fear in its father's arms." By the end of the retreat, I had a longing to have what she had but I just didn't think it was possible. I remember saying to her, "This isn't going to work sweetheart, you're simple and little and I am just too complicated." I did not yet understand what she said could be true for me: "Our Lord's love shines out just as much through a little soul who yields completely to His Grace as it does through the greatest." After this initial encounter, I felt like St. Therese would literally stalk me everywhere I went. While she was never forceful in her desire to be a close friend of mine, I began to resent her in some ways because she had what I longed for but thought I could never have.

Two years later, after having just gotten out of a long-term relationship and moving across the country, I was in a period of major transition and was questioning where I was heading in life. It was then that I was introduced to a new saint: St. Elizabeth of the Trinity. Much like St. Therese, St. Elizabeth was known for being a little soul who saw the Lord's love as simple: "It seems to me that I have found my heaven on earth, because my heaven is you, my God, and you are in my soul. You in me, and I in you...Little by little, the soul gets used to living in [Your] sweet company, it understands that it is carrying within it a little Heaven where the God of love has fixed His home." Unlike my experience with St. Therese, St. Elizabeth was very forceful in pursuing a friendship with me. It was as if she kicked in the door of my heart and said, "What's up fam, I'm home." This time around, my desire for childlikeness had grown even greater and, for the first time, my eyes were truly opened. Not only was this littleness possible but it was the answer to everything. The scripture literally said, "Father...you have hidden these things from the wise and the learned you have revealed them to the childlike."

This shift in perspective wound up being one of the most crucial changes in my life. I began to petition the Lord daily to allow me to become little so that I could know what it was he desired for me to do in this life. Long story short, just a few months later, I found myself on another silent retreat where the opening talk was on being a child of God. To be honest, at first, I was saying to myself, "Blah Blah blah, we've all heard this before" but then it hit me like a ton of bricks. I'm already little because I am the Father's little one. Upon realizing this, I ran to the chapel to tell Jesus, as if he didn't already know, and it was in that moment that he revealed everything to me for it was in that moment that he asked me to be his priest.



While I continue to wrestle with what it means to live out this littleness, I've come to experience a great freedom in realizing that the fire of "childlike littleness" can set me ablaze without consuming and destroying my "big" personality. In many ways and many times over, I owe so much of this to the witnesses of St. Therese of Lisieux and St. Elizabeth of the Trinity. The way in which they lived out their lives in such simplicity and trust stirred up such a hunger in me to love the Lord in the same way. I would not be here with you all today had it not been for these two French nuns that I never even had the privilege of meeting this side of heaven. It makes perfect sense that this would be the case as both of these women. At the end of

their lives, they shared their desire to spend eternity praying for souls on earth. I leave you with their desires expressed in their own words. "When I die, I will send down a shower of roses from the heavens, I will spend my heaven by doing good on earth."

(St. Therese of Lisieux) "My mission in heaven will be to draw souls, helping them to go out of themselves to cling to God, with a spontaneous, love-filled action, and to keep them in that great interior silence which enables God to make his mark on them, to transform them into himself." (St. Elizabeth of the Trinity)
